

When We Wrestle: God Breaks Us Down When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man.



When We Wrestle: God Breaks Us Down God makes us more dependent on Him before He transforms and blesses us.



When We Wrestle: God Builds Us Up Then the man said, "Let me go, for it is daybreak." But Jacob replied, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." Genesis 32:26 (NIV)



When We Wrestle: God Builds Us Up God delights in faith that refuses to let go.
